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From the Pastor's Desk

Welcome to February!

As we look at the world around us, bearing witness to the changes happening and also being made (I think this is an important distinction. Some changes simply happen, other changes are forces into existence), we may find ourselves afraid, hurt, shocked, or in disbelief as we see events happening that shake our understanding of the world and how things should be or should be done.

I am sorry to write in generalities, but I think it helps to recognize that the world itself is facing these things. It is not unique to the realm of American politics. Across the entirety of the world we are witnessing political movements rising, we are witnessing tyrannical or dictatorial leaders making decisions to hurt their own people, subsets of their own people, or the people of other nations. We are witnessing wars and threats of wars. We are witnessing natural disasters and famines.

The reality is that these things are always happening and will continue to happen. The world we live and the people that populate it are not perfect. We haven't had to deal with this type of upheaval domestically for a long time, at least the majority of Americans have not had to deal with it for a long time. Unfortunately, there is a minority in our country where the new reality for many of us is their normal reality. The question for us, is how do we respond? What steps do we need to take? Where is God calling on us to be?

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I believe that God doesn't change. God is who God is. When the Law was written in Exodus, Leviticus, Numbers and Deuteronomy, God showed an example of how to live with one another. Care for the widow, the orphan, the alien, the poor, te sick, the prisoner, and all those existing on the margins was encoded into the Law. We bear witness to it later on in the prophets, when God called on and empowered prophets and sent them before the kings to tell them of how they and the society at large were falling short of God's commands to love the poor and marginalized. We can read this in the Gospel accounts and Epistles of the New Testament. It isn't written in coded language for only the select to understand. Jesus commands us to love God with the entirety of our beings, to love our neighbors as ourselves, and to love each other as we are loved. He tells us that to know him is to care for the sick, the widow, the orphan, the prisoner, and all those less fortunate than ourselves.

It is very easy to sit back and think that others are called to this work, that God hasn't called us into the specific ministries that are affected be the constant disorder of both domestic and international politics. It can be easy to say that others are taking care of that thing that we don't want to approach. But can we honestly look at the world and say that we aren't responsible? In his writings on the Ten Commandments, the father of the Reformed movements and Reformed theology, John Calvin, writes that they are not simply negative commands, but positive orders telling us that we are not simply not to do the negative thing (murder, steal, covet, etc.), but that we are also to work for the betterment of our neighbors. We are called to actively support those around us and care for them.

I don't now what that specifically looks like for me as an individual. I definitely cannot speak to what it means for each of you, nor do I know specifically what it means for us as a congregation. I will be in prayer for each of us, and our church as we navigate the reality around us. I ask that you join me in prayer as well. Please call or email me if you are interested in prayer and study resources. Come and sit down with me if you have ideas about what it means for us to engage with what is happening.

SESSION UPDATE

Clerk's Corner

The first meeting of 2025 for the Session was held on January 21, 2025 via Zoom because of the frigid weather. A warm welcome was given to the Class of 2027: Patti Keenan and Carol Reed. One of the Session's discussion topics was when to close the church building due to weather. It was decided that the church building will close during weekdays when Youngstown State University closes due to inclement weather. A policy is being discussed to inform the congregation if the church must cancel Sunday worship services due to weather.

Rev. Warner advised a new tenant was going to rent office space in the building; that is The Andrea Mahone Foundation. They would be moving in soon. He added that all other tenants have signed leases for 2025. Rev. Warner also advised that for Ash Wednesday, Eastminster Presbytery will be having a joint-church service at Westminster Presbyterian Church in Boardman – details will be announced. A new Adult Forum Bible study will start for the first Sunday of Lent.

A lot of discussion was held over the building. An update was given on the plumbing repairs in the second-floor restrooms. In an email vote prior to the meeting, Session approved \$20,000 for the repairs. Additionally, \$7,000 was approved for the BEG Committee to purchase audio and video equipment and computers for the Sanctuary. And finally, at the Finance Committee's request, two new check signers were appointed: Glenn Patterson and Chris Soller.

The next meeting of the Session will be on Tuesday, February 18, 2025 at 7 p.m. at the church. Session meets monthly on the third Tuesday of the month at 7 p.m.

FPC Book Club Tuesday, February 11, 2025 at 10 A.M.

Our selection for February is a Classic/Humor – *A Confederacy of Dunces* by John Kennedy Toole-Winner of the 1981 Pulitzer for fiction. Set in New Orleans in the early 1960's. It follows the adventures of Ignatius J. Reilly, an educated but lazy 30-year-old man that is still living with his mother. In his quest to find a job, Ignatius finds himself caught up in hilarious adventures with colorful French Quarter characters. The many subplots that weave through *A Confederacy of Dunces* are as complicated as anything you'll find in a Dickens novel, and just as beautifully ties together in the end. But it is Ignatius—selfish, domineering, and deluded, tragic and comic and larger than life—who carries the story.

Below are the books we are reading this year.

MARCH – Historical Fiction – *The Book of Lost friends* by Lisa Wingate. Brings to life startling stories from actual "Lost Friends" advertisements that appeared in Southern newspapers after the Civil War, as newly freed slaves desperately searched for loved ones who had been sold away.

APRIL – Nonfiction – *The Spy and the Traitor: The Greatest espionage Story of the Cold War* by Ben McIntyre. Story of Oleg Gordievsky, the Russian whose secret work helped hasten the end of the Cold War. Best Seller NY Times.

MAY – Historical Fiction – *The Women: A Novel* by Kristen Hannah. In 1965, Francis "Frankie" McGrath joins the Army Nurse Corps and follows her brother's path to serve in Vietnam.

JUNE – Romance – *The Paper Palace* by Miranda Cowley Hiller. A story of summer, secrets and lies. In the course of a single day on Cape Cod, one woman must make a life-changing decision that has been brewing for decades. Best Seller, Reese's BC

JULY - Biography - Bonhoeffer: Pastor, Martyr, Prophet, Spy by Eric Metaxis.

AUGUST – Young Adult Fiction – *The Last Brass Ring* by Liz Hill. Lilli Whitaker spends the summer of 1989 before her senior year with a job at a run-down amusement park, which leads to romance, new friendships, and a long-hidden family secret.

SEPTEMBER – Historical Fiction – *The Butcher: a Novel* by Joyce Carol Oates. A harrowing story based on history about Doctor Silas Weir, a gyno-psychologist at a women's asylum in the 19th century.

OCTOBER – Nonfiction – *Heartwood: The Art of Living with the End in Mind* by Barbara Becker. Becker inspires readers to live with the end in mind and proves that turning toward loss rather than away is the only true way to live life to its fullest.

NOVEMBER – Historical Fiction – *This Tender Land* by William Kent Krueger. The unforgettable story of four orphans who travel the Mississippi River on a life-changing odyssey during the Great Depression.
