#### From the Pastor's Desk

The cycle of time continues on. It seems like Christmas was only Yesterday, and Easter was only a month or two ago, but here we are finding ourselves almost on the eve of Lent once again.

It definitely has ties to the Catholic traditions, but it might have been one of the many "babies thrown out in the bathwater" of the Reformation. Let us prepare by living into the promises made on our behalf, and by worshipping and praising God through the care we offer to others.

The church must be relevant to the world, not by living up to the standards and expectations of the world, but by working to live up to the example of God.

#### **SESSION UPDATE**

Clerk's Corner

The Session of the First Presbyterian Church of Youngstown met on Tuesday, February 18, 2025. We had a special guest join us for the first fifteen minutes of the meeting, the Rev. Dr. Dan Schomer. Rev. Dr. Schomer is the Moderator of the Resource Committee of Eastminster Presbytery. Among its many tasks, the Resource Committee also deals with mission projects and resourcing congregations. The Committee has a new initiative called "Serving Others/Serving Christ Together." This provides hands-on mission opportunities for those who would like to do mission work but their church is too small to take on mission projects. The Resource Committee has developed several opportunities to work with groups aiding people. The first two are on May 17, 2025 in Akron and on October 18, 2025 in Warren. The Committee has planned an out-of-state 5-day mission trip to Detroit in September of 2026, and a week-long out-of-state mission trip to Staten Island, New York in the Fall of 2027. Finally, there will be a week-long mission trip to Puerto Rico in 2028. After Rev. Dr. Schomer's presentation and during its regular business meeting, the Session agreed to participate in the Presbytery's mission initiative. If anyone is interested in any of the mission opportunities, please watch for the bulletin announcements and articles in the *Forecaster*. These sound like exciting opportunities.

There will be Lenten adult study classes from 9:45 to 10:45 a.m. starting on March 9, 2025. Lenten devotional material will be available on tables in the narthex.

The Schaff Lecture will be Wednesday, April 23, 2025. Watch for bulletin announcements and articles in the *Forecaster* asking for volunteers. We will need lots of hands that day to help with registration, assisting visitors, and preparation for and clean-up of the meal.

Session approved requests by the Mission Committee (1) for the goal of this year's One Great Hour of Sharing of \$1500, and (2) the Mission Committee will be assisting Ohio Living in creating "care packages" for the YSU students who reside next door at the Campus Lofts.

The next Session meeting will be Tuesday, March 18, 2025 at 7 p.m.





# Welcome back, Taizé

The FPC 225<sup>th</sup> anniversary committee suggested revisiting a prepandemic event: an evening Taizé service. Larry Harris, our music director, took over from there and has selected Thursday evening, March 27 at 7:05 p.m. for a Lenten Taizé in our sanctuary.

Taizé is meditative worship designed to bring all Christian denominations together. Song, silence, and scripture are entwined with the purpose of encouraging peace and reconciliation. Taizé is named for the small town in France where Roger Schütz founded this ecumenical monastic order in 1940. Worship included Bible readings and texts set to simple tunes, which are then sung repetitively; the music is enhanced by instrumentalists and vocal solos. Attendees will find that Taizé is especially meaningful during Lent since its focus is prayer and introspection.

The sanctuary will lend itself to the beauty of this service as hundreds – yes hundreds – of lighted candles will offer illumination. The simplicity of the music makes it easy enough for all to sing while more experienced singers can fill in various harmonies.

We are inviting other area churches to join us, so please feel free to spread the news yourself and bring any guests with you. All are invited! Again, a Lenten Taizé will be on Thursday, March 27 at 7:05 p.m.

Our selection for March is a Historical Fiction – *The Book of Lost Friends* by Lisa Wingate. This book brings to life startling stories from actual "Lost Friends" advertisements that appeared in Southern newspapers after the Civil War, as newly freed slaves desperately searched for loved ones who had been sold away. This dramatic historical novel of three young women searching for family amid the destruction of the post-Civil War South, and of a modern-day teacher who learns of their story and its vital connection to her students' lives.

APRIL – Nonfiction – *The Spy and the Traitor: The Greatest espionage Story of the Cold War* by Ben McIntyre. Story of Oleg Gordievsky, the Russian whose secret work helped hasten the end of the Cold War. Best Seller NY Times.

MAY – Historical Fiction – *The Women: A Novel* by Kristen Hannah. In 1965, Francis "Frankie" McGrath joins the Army Nurse Corps and follows her brother's path to serve in Vietnam.

JUNE – Romance – *The Paper Palace* by Miranda Cowley Hiller. A story of summer, secrets and lies. In the course of a single day on Cape Cod, one woman must make a life-changing decision that has been brewing for decades. Best Seller, Reese's BC

JULY - Biography - Bonhoeffer: Pastor, Martyr, Prophet, Spy by Eric Metaxis.

AUGUST – Young Adult Fiction – *The Last Brass Ring* by Liz Hill. Lilli Whitaker spends the summer of 1989 before her senior year with a job at a run-down amusement park, which leads to romance, new friendships, and a long-hidden family secret.

SEPTEMBER – Historical Fiction – *The Butcher: a Novel* by Joyce Carol Oates. A harrowing story based on history about Doctor Silas Weir, a gyno-psychologist at a women's asylum in the  $19^{th}$  century.

OCTOBER – Nonfiction – *Heartwood: The Art of Living with the End in Mind* by Barbara Becker. Becker inspires readers to live with the end in mind and proves that turning toward loss rather than away is the only true way to live life to its fullest.

NOVEMBER – Historical Fiction – *This Tender Land* by William Kent Krueger. The unforgettable story of four orphans who travel the Mississippi River on a life-changing odyssey during the Great Depression.
